

Theme introduction

United is a geography-driven theme in which pupils learn about the four countries of the UK and their physical and human geographical features. Pupils will learn what it means to be a British citizen, focusing on the British Values and the things that the UK is well-known for such as food, sport and music. Through a history focus, pupils will discuss who the kings and queens have been throughout history and then discover how King Charles II played a significant role during a major event in British history – the Great Fire of London. The art Explores will provide pupils with the opportunity to make their own coat of arms and collage.

Essential knowledge/concepts

- 1. There are four countries in the UK: England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland.
- 2. A capital city is usually the largest, busiest city in a country.
- 3. Physical features are the geographical features that are natural and not man-made.
- 4. Human features are the geographical features made by humans.
- 5. Humans are having a negative effect on the environment by dropping litter and sending litter to landfill sites.
- 6. Each country of the UK has a dish that it is well-known for.
- 7. The Royal Albert Hall in London is a music hall where many UK artists and bands have performed.
- 8. The British Values are: Democracy, Individual Liberty, Respect & Tolerance and Rule of Law.
- 9. Money comes from different sources and we can spend or save it.
- 10. Historical events can be ordered on a timeline.
- 11. There have been many kings and queens throughout history.
- 12. Stamps have a portrait of the Queen on and we place them on letters when sending them in the post.
- 13. The Great Fire of London happened in 1666 and King Charles II helped to bring the fire to an end.
- 14. A coat of arms represents a family.
- 15. The Union Flag is made up of the flags of England, Scotland and Northern Ireland.

Exhibit

Pupils to hold a 'United' celebration where they celebrate all that they have learned about the UK.

Pupils can cook some of the meals from the theme, share their artwork and learning, and play some UK music.

Teachers can invite other classes, parents or the community to attend.

Possible wider experiences

Pupils visit a local city and take a walk around it, looking for human and physical geographical features.

Flipped learning opportunities

Research a city in the UK and create a poster about it. Pupils focus on including a landmark and another place to visit.

Family learning suggestion

Pupils research famous UK dishes and create one at home with their families. Pupils could write down the recipe for their friends to make the same meal.

Or

Pupils create a Great Fire of London artwork. They can use black card to cut out the silhouettes of buildings, and chalk or pastel to create a fiery scene in the background.
